# From the Principal

### Parent/Teacher Interviews Reminder

### Monday 3rd April - Friday 7th April

Our final reminder that we have our first formal reporting to parents for the year **next week**. These meetings with your child's class teacher provide families the opportunity to discuss their progress over the term and the goals they have set for their learning. While times are offered throughout the week, **the main evening time is on Monday 3rd April.** Interpreters will be made available for those needing this service.

The National Literacy and Numeracy assessments for all year 3, 5 and 7 students will occur from Tuesday 9th through to Thursday 11th May (Week 2 Term 2)

We encourage all students to fully participate in these assessments. If there is some reason why you wish to withdraw your child, please see your child's class teacher with a written request and also see Vicki Poulain to complete an official withdrawal form. These must be completed by no later than Friday 5th May which is the last day of week 1 next term.

### **Neural Pathways**

Room 29 have been learning about the brain and how our neural pathways assist our learning. The human brain is a complex organ that allows us to think, move, feel, see, hear, taste and smell. It controls our body and receives, analyses and stores information.

Like every other muscle, it needs exercise. In class we have been doing brain exercises to help improve our concentration and learning. By repeating tasks and trying to use both sides of our brain, we are strengthening our neural pathways, allowing us to improve our skills and assist us in having a growth mindset.

The brain produces electrical signals, which together with chemical reactions, let parts of the body communicate. Nerves send these signals throughout the body.

The brain and spinal cord are made up of many cells, including neurons. Neurons are cells that send and receive electro-chemical signals to and from the brain and nervous system. There are about 100 billion neurons in the brain.

We created our own neurons using scrap materials. We also needed to include labels to show our understanding of each part of the neuron.





## **The Winning Goal**

## **Police Band**

On Thursday 15th March the students were entertained by the SA Police Band. There was a woodwind section with piccolo, flute, saxophone and clarinet. The Brass section included trumpet, French horn, trombone and tuba, which was white and made from fibreglass to make it much lighter to carry than a completely brass tuba. The drummer also had a steel drum which was played with mallets and was very tuneful.

The band played lots of different theme songs from cartoons like the Simpsons,

Peppa Pig and Angry Birds. The police also shared the important messages of safety. These included the importance of wearing seat belts whilst in a car, wearing a helmet when riding a bike and also the

dangers of walking around the streets with headphones on as it makes it hard to hear the traffic.



## **Halogen Young Leaders Day**

As part of our Peace Committee activities, some members were given the opportunity to visit the Convention Centre last Monday to be a part of the 'Halogen Young Leaders Day'. This National Young Leaders Day is an annual event created in 1997 by the Halogen Foundation to develop strong leadership values amongst young Australians, to encourage them to inspire and influence a generation of young people to lead themselves and others well.

When we went to the Adelaide Convention Centre with Miss Sarah and Mr Harding for the Young Leaders Conference, we listened to six inspiring speakers encouraging us to be leaders.

Sam Skinner runs this program and spoke to us about the ideas behind the program and how she grew up. At one point Jemma and Dubsy, who were the MCs, came on - Dubsy in a flamingo costume and Jemma with a saxophone. They did a duet together.

Another speaker was Brent Reilly, who is a retired football player and was the most inspiring speaker. He told us his story about the head injury that almost cost him his life and how he stayed positive even though he couldn't go on with his dream of playing AFL football. He was running at full pace during a game when he ran into another player's knee and he was knocked out and was unconscious for over 12 hours. When he woke up the nurse told him that he might not remember his wife's name. He had 70 staples in his head and 4 needles. He told us that a growth mindset can save a life.

Tom and Jakob were two other speakers. Last year these primary school boys attended this event and were inspired so much that they started a charity called "Kick In My Boots". These two boys collected football boots and contacted the SANFL, who flew them to the Indigenous lands in Central Australia where they gave the boots to the children.

The Honourable Kelly Vincent was also a speaker and is an amazing woman. She is sadly disabled, but it doesn't stop her. She loves poems and quotes and tries to follow them. One quote is "We are all born to be included."

Matt Cosgrove is an author and he was really funny and told us that just because his publisher wanted him to write little kids' books didn't mean he had to. He found another publisher so that he could do what HE wanted to do with his books. He also told us that when he was young he was practising for a play and had to stand on a chair. At that moment a man pushed the wheeled stage because he didn't think it was in the middle. It was then that Matt fell off his chair, which is why he is scared of public speaking on stage.

The Premier, Jay Weatherill, whose daughter was also attending the conference as a student, spoke to us about things we need to do to be a leader. Unfortunately the lady who started "Shoe Boxes of Love" was meant to be there, but she has just had a baby!

It was a bit awkward when we had to get up to dance all the time because there wasn't much space. Although during the recess break we could go into a space and wear headphones and dance. It



was like a silent disco and people looked weird as though the people were dancing to no music!

All in all we enjoyed the experience and came away feeling inspired to be leaders.

### At the Movies

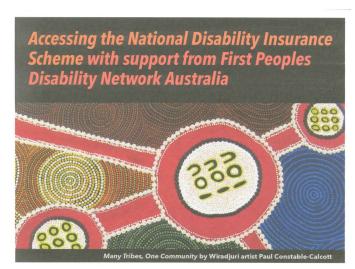
In Week 7 the students from Rooms 8 and 9 were lucky enough to go to the movies to see the film "Moana", which was presented by the Ladies of Variety.
