#### 2023 School Fees are overdue

Thank you to those parents who have settled their accounts for this year's school fees. Please remember to apply for School Card if you are on a low income—this needs to be done each year. We accept various methods of payment including EFTPOS, Centrelink deductions and direct debit. We also have the **Qkr app** that can be downloaded from our website to pay accounts.

Any outstanding accounts will be sent to the Education Department's debt collection team and then referred to the Auditor General's Department.

#### **Industrial Action - School Closure**

Parafield Gardens Primary School will be **closed on Friday 1st September 2023** due to a vote for industrial action by members of the Australian Education Union at this site.

The Education Director has approved the closure on the grounds that insufficient staff will be on duty to enable me as Principal to ensure that adequate standards of student safety and welfare can be provided.

Normal education programs will commence at the site from Monday 4<sup>th</sup> September, 2023.

Please be advised that our OSHC service will be available to cover the period of the industrial action. Families who wish to use this service must book a place by contacting the OSHC on 0401121430 by 12pm Thursday 31<sup>st</sup> August to ensure appropriate staffing ratios are maintained. Families who have not booked a place at the OSHC by this time will not be able to access the service.

## **Aboriginal STEM Congress**

Recently four of our upper primary students attended the 2023 Aboriginal STEM Congress with Mr Luke and Miss Tammy. They were joined by First Nations students from across the state. The Congress celebrates our history of 60,000 years of STEM conducted by the first Australians. Over two big days our students heard from inspirational keynote speakers and engaged in a range of STEM activities linked to First Nations culture. The students were fully engaged in the program and were excellent ambassadors for our school. The students involved were Faith, Lawrie, Mason and Drey.

At the STEM conference we listened to some speakers including one man who talked about sea animals and another man who discovered when he was younger that he was Aboriginal and it was really interesting. He asked us to brainstorm things that we would like to happen in the future. One of the ideas our group came up with was to make a book and a movie about the Aboriginal people in the bush and also we thought about having flying cars, flying submarines and another one about saving the bilby because it is endangered.

We made motors using batteries and paper clips but it was hard to get the wire to spin the paper clips properly. We also made Lego robots and we coded them to make them dance using an ipad. It was hard to do the coding but once I learnt how to do it I helped the other people in our group.

The best part of the conference was taking part in the activities.


## Early Years Swimming

**Harvesting our Vegie Garden**On May 1<sup>st</sup> students worked hard preparing the vegetable garden, located behind the Hive, to plant our vegetables. On August 11<sup>th</sup> we harvested our cauliflower and made cauliflower soup on the very same day. Super fresh!

We changed the chicken stock in the ingredients to vegetable stock so that everyone in our class could try it. First we washed our hands and next we were each given a vegetable to prepare. Some children peeled potatoes, some cut the potatoes up whilst others chopped the onions or the cauliflower. We then followed the recipe to create our soup. Everyone tried the soup and lots of students came back for seconds and took their own lunch home. The children all enjoyed the process of making soup from vegetables picked from our school garden. Here is the recipe:

1 tablespoon Classic Olive Oil

1 large brown onion, chopped

2 garlic cloves, crushed

1 head of cauliflower cut into florets

500grams Sebago potatoes, peeled and chopped

1 litre Massel chicken or vegetable liquid stock

1/2 cup pure cream

Put all together into a pot and cook until the potatoes are soft. Wait until it cools before blending until smooth. Enjoy! **Ms Tracy Smyth Room 12**

## **Book Week**





## Science Week 2023: Innovation – Powering Future Industries

The school theme for National Science Week in 2023 was *Innovation: Powering Future Industries*. The theme incorporates the advancement in technology in all industries, especially using artificial intelligence (AI). The curriculum focus of the theme is on:

- Science as a Human Endeavour
- Chemical Sciences
- Physical Sciences
- · Earth and Space Sciences, and
- Biological Sciences

Along with the Sustainability cross-curriculum priority.







**Mirror Mess** was the most creative insect name for this new species and it came from Indie, Indiana and Japnoor's team.

A new type of insect has been spotted near the school. It's eating plants in the garden, and people are worried it will spread to nearby farms and damage food crops. To stop the insects scientists need to study them, and for that they need specimens. Year 5 & 6 students were challenged to design, construct and test insect traps. In the words of Mrs Sobey, 'few bugs were caught, but much fun was had.'













The year 3 and 4 students were challenged to: Design a better paper plane.



The reception, year 1 and 2 students learnt about colour transference and surface tension through their experimentation with designing apparatus to blow bubbles using various 3 dimensional objects.















## Maths Month Showcase of Powerful Learning




Room 11 were learning about multiplication and division facts!


















Room 15, 16 & 17 have been integrating their maths learning with Science and English while thinking sustainably about how to manage organic waste better.

## **FESTIVAL of MUSIC CHOIR 2023**

The Primary Schools Music Festival is a South Australian State Heritage icon under the direction of The Public Primary Schools Music Society and the Department for Education. The focus of this festival is to engage students in artistic excellence, cultural diversity and social inclusion through performance in Music and the Arts. This choral program has been an integral part of life for generations of public-school students throughout South Australia for over 130 years.

Parafield Gardens Primary School students who are in Year 5 and 6 were offered the opportunity to participate in the Festival of Music choir for 2023. Our choir has 38 students from 6 different classes and have been rehearsing for their performance every week for an hour on Tuesdays since Term 1. Our concert will be held this term at the Festival Theatre on Friday September 22<sup>nd</sup> at 7:00pm.





The theme for the Festival this year is 'World of Tomorrow' featuring original works by reknowned composer, Paul Jarman. His songs are focused on the impact of technology on our modern society; the positives and negatives and wonderings of what the future may bring. There are also some favourite songs included in our choral repertoire, including *Proud Mary, Nothing Else Matters and Keep on Movin'*, as well as works by local composers and arrangements by Festival staff.

Our school has two soloists featuring on our concert night. Ella (Room 17) will be opening the show with her *Proud Mary* solo. Isaac (Room 15) will be making his DJ debut using a looping machine to accompany the choir in the *I am the Earth Remix*.
