#### **SAPSASA Cricket**

During Week 4 we played in the SAPSASA Cricket competition along with Saish from our class and Agam from Room 16, and we played at places including St Claire and Grange Oval. It was a 4 day long competition and we felt confident about winning. Even though we were a bit inattentive in the fielding in the first game we soon became tighter and more powerful, with the result of winning the game in the grand final. We smashed a total of 225 runs while the other team was all out for 115. Kavish is a good bowler because he has a good line and length and he got 2 wickets. Ahan was the wicket keeper which is a hard job because the balls fly around and particularly as Kavish is a spin bowler. Kavish gave me secret signals so that I knew which way the ball was going to move. It was also a new experience playing on a turf pitch rather than cement. It was very exciting.

#### Ingenuity Expo

On Wednesday 1st November the Year 5 students from Room 34A and 34B went on an excursion to the Ingenuity Expo at the Adelaide Convention Centre. This is an annual showcase of university student projects exploring the dynamic world and applications of engineering, computer and mathematical sciences. It celebrates the ideas of the young men and women who could potentially shape the world's technical, social and commercial future. While at the Ingenuity exhibition students engaged in a range of interactive activities, whilst learning about engineering, computer and mathematical sciences.

We went on the train to the city and got to see different cool things at the Adelaide Convention Centre. There were different stations around the whole area for us to visit with lots of projects being created by Adelaide University students. There were over 200 exhibits, one of which involved creating robots to be used for mining and cave finding. The robots were circular which would make



them faster and more agile to be able to roll around inside the mines and record everything. We also had a competition where we had to guess what is at the back of your phone. l guessed correctly and I received 2 wireless chargers. There are 5 parts to it including gold, silver and aluminium foil. There was a veterinarian station where we learnt how to resuscitate an animal. It's not like giving CPR to a person - you have to put a tube down the animal's

throat then pump air into the lungs. You have to use a pump similar to a blood pressure pump - pump it then wait and repeat this process to help the animal to breathe. My friend and I were doing it with a model and it looked very real. We also learnt how to bandage a dog's leg and got to create our own cat toy.

We also visited an exhibition about erosion where students had created a water tank to demonstrate how the waves erode the cliffs causing them to collapse. They could use it to learn how fast the erosion takes so that it can be avoided or slowed down. There was also a station that showed us how to recycle the black powder inside our phones, which is very dangerous. We learnt how to recycle it back into plastic bottles and it's made of neutrons, electrons and other things. He put liquid inside a test tube and when left for a few days it turns to crystals and when it is added to the black powder it turns white, and then it can be reused.

There was a vegan ice cream exhibit (our favourite) where students had used an ice cream machine but had taken out some of the components and added new ones which they had designed. By recreating this machine they were able to make a vegan ice cream for people who are lactose intolerant and it didn't melt. They had created unmeltable ice cream - a dream come true! It was delicious!



There was a coding exhibit where we held a cube and by coding we could create other objects. There was another station where we used a microscope to see how diamonds and gems are made and we learnt that diamonds are made from ash and compressed until they are very hard - it's one of the hardest stones in the world. There was a chemistry station where we could see that the atoms inside a diamond are a pyramid shape. Another group of students have designed a kangaroo robot that will be able to walk on Mars and be able to pick up rocks and sand so that scientists can study them.

It was all very inspiring for us. My aunty (Masomeh) is an engineer so I might want to be an engineer too or a lawyer. I (Rehat) want to learn coding because I want to own my business and to be able to create my own website.

#### Year 3-5 Swimming

As an important part of our Health and PE curriculum, all year 3 - 5 students have been involved in swimming lessons this week at the Elizabeth Aquadome Swimming Centre. These lessons have been conducted by qualified Department for Education instructors.

On the first day we went into the pool and our teacher Ms Johnson told us to float on our backs for 30 seconds. Then we got to do some freestyle swimming and afterwards we practised breaststroke. After all of that we had time for some free play in the pool.







During the week we learnt about water safety using life jackets and we floated on our backs with them on. After that we kept our life jackets on and we had to push our arms backwards and forward to move the water around us and it helped us to stay up and we also had to call for help as though we were in trouble in the water. We had to go on our backs and float and put one hand up and call out "Help!!" and we had to move our hands through the water again to help us stay afloat.

While we still had our jackets on we sat on the edge of the pool and we got into the water and we had to go on our backs and kick back to the edge of the pool again, but we had to be careful we didn't bump our heads on the side of the pool because we were going backwards. Ms Johnson was scared we would hit our heads so she told us to turn our heads around a bit so we could see where we were going. Another safety thing we learnt was to sit in the water and hold our knees really close to our chest which helped us stay afloat in the water.

We did this both with and without our life jackets. We learnt these safety rules so that if we ever fall out of a boat we would know how to save ourselves. Other water safety rules included learning how to rescue someone else. Some people went into the water and others stayed on the edge of the pool and had to throw things to them, for example bowls or a bucket that you could flip over and lean on. The people then had to kick to the edge of the pool. After that we swapped around so everyone had a turn. Another safety activity was to use a pool noodle to save someone. So again some of the people had to say "Help! Help!" and pretend they were in trouble in the water. The people at the edge of the pool had to lie down on their stomachs and hold out a noodle to someone in the water but keep the end tight under our armpit then we had to slowly bring the person to the edge. When they got there we had to call out "Safe".



We also learnt how to encourage someone to the side of the pool by kneeling down and calmly calling them over and once they got to the side of the pool they had to put their hands on the edge of the pool and we put our hands over theirs and told them they were safe. We have learnt so much about how to be safe in the water it was very interesting and helpful. Fiona and Abel Room 30

## DFS will be visting Parafield Gardens Primary School on: 31st January -16th of February 2024

Get ready for a healthy start to Term 1! Dental For Schools (DFS) is returning to our school to provide essential dental check-ups for your child. To ensure a smooth process, <u>parents will receive a consent form during the first week of Term 1</u>. Simply complete the form to grant permission for your child to receive a comprehensive dental check-up at school. The DFS service may inclue:

- Check-up (oral examination)
- Clean (removal of plaque/calculus)
- Application of fluoride (remineralisation agent)
- X-rays (diagnostic bitewings) If required

If additional dental treatment such as fillings, crowns, or extractions is needed, we'll promptly get in touch to discuss a personalised treatment plan that may be completed at school. A dental report will be included in your child's take-home gift pack.

If you're uncertain about Medicare eligibility or need assistance, please complete the form, and our team will reach out to provide guidance.
