Reflections of Reconciliation

In this together

Reconciliation Day is a day where we acknowledge all the Aboriginal peoples. It is a day to commemorate what the British did to the Aboriginal people. Reconciliation has elements of truth, justice, forgiveness, healing, reparation, and love. The Aboriginal people were treated badly, the British people did things such as, throwing them in jail for no reason; everything was unfair and they couldn't see their family! Reconciliation to me is a day to feel happy, sad and to feel sympathy for the Aboriginal people. Some examples of unfairness to the Aboriginal people are in Uncle Doug's story. He told us about his life, one example is that Uncle Doug was talking about saluting the Union Jack. One day he didn't salute the flag, he got thrown in jail for three weeks! That would be so unfair! This to me is unfair, mean, unequal and discriminatory. Terra Nullius is Latin for the land belonging to no one. Mabo Day is one of the most important days in Reconciliation week. The Mabo case finally acknowledged the history of the indigenous land rights in Australia, they put an end to the lie of terra nullius and changed the foundation of the Australian land law. It isn't fair that people were judged by the colour of their skin - they should be judged by the content of their character. Making a link to Martin Luther King Jr, he had a dream that all people would be judged on who each person was as a person and not on the colour of that person's skin. He dreamed we would follow the ideas in the Declaration of Independence that all people are created equal. Martin Luther King's speech is about how people in America where being judged by the colour of their skin. It's from America but it's the same concept.

"I have a dream that one day every valley shall be exalted, every hill and mountain shall be made low, the rough places plains, and the crooked places will be made straight, and before the Lord will be revealed, and all flesh shall see it together. This is our hope. This is the faith that I go back to the mount with."

Reconciliation to me means friendship and coming together as a community. Reconciliation is to remember what has happened in the past, when the British came to Australia and took over the land of the Indigenous people. The British thought that Australia was Terra Nullius, meaning land belonging to no one. Once the British came to Australia, they came up with their own rules and released animals into the wild. The animals ruined Australia's ecosystem, destroying plants and trees and roaming around the land. The British thought that they had the power to control the land, building infrastructure, fences and all kinds of stuff. They forced the Indigenous children to learn in schools full of white people and Indigenous people were forced to follow rules, otherwise they would end up in jail. They had to salute the Union Jack, speak English and not in their native language, and they weren't allowed to do traditional things. It was the Stolen Generation, when the British took control of the land.

The Stolen Generation was the worst thing that has happened in the past in Australia. Indigenous children were taken away from their families, forced to learn in white schools, and the Indigenous people were forced to walk on this side of the street and this certain row of seats in the pictures (cinemas). The Indigenous children were also forced to live with white families and to live with them forever. Indigenous people had to get a licence in order to walk down the street, and they were not allowed to speak, dance or do anything that they would normally do, but they were forced to speak English instead.

After a while, there was an Indigenous man named Eddie Mabo, who changed what Indigenous people could do in Australia. Eddie Mabo studied a lot in university to go to the high court. He went to the high court to let Indigenous people finally do things they should be allowed to do. This is when the referendum started. Indigenous people and the white people were allowed to vote. 90% of people chose to let Indigenous people do things that they should be allowed to do. But unfortunately Eddie Mabo died from cancer 5 months before his victory, but he will be remembered.

Do you know about Eddie Mabo? He was the famous person who went to Australia's highest court and proved Terra Nullius wrong. Sadly, he died 5 months before the decision was made. Another thing is the famous Kevin Rudd speech. The 'sorry speech' was really emotional for many Aboriginal People. The way Aboriginal People got their freedom is from the 1967 referendum. It took them ten years to get the same rights as the white people. Before this they needed to have an exemption to even walk down the street!

The Aboriginal people thought they would give them a chance to be nice, but they weren't. Learning about when the children were taken, I feel sad for the parents too because they tried to hide their children from the white people so they would be safe and that would have been very scary.

If I was taken from my family I would feel scared that those people didn't trust my parents to look after me. So everything that I had grown up with would have been taken away from me and I would be so scared. As grown ups those stolen children would not remember their real families because they were so young when they were taken. They would have forgotten their own language and all of their Aboriginal cultures. It is so sad. I hope nothing like this ever happens again.

High school planning is also in full swing to welcome year 7s and year 8s together in 2022.


