From the Principal

Parent/Teacher Interviews Reminder

Tuesday 3rd April - Wednesday 11th April

This is our final reminder that we have our first formal reporting to parents for the year **next week**. These meetings with your child's class teacher provide families the opportunity to discuss their progress over the term and the goals they have set for their learning. While times are offered throughout the week, **the main evening time is on Monday 9th April**. Interpreters have been booked for those needing this service and we hope those families can make their allocated time.

I encourage you, if you have not already done so, to make the time to meet with your child's class teacher with your child and value the chance to formally meet and discuss their progress. Parent teacher interviews are an important part of our reporting to parents and a chance to set up a positive working partnership in support of your child. The student goals recently sent home will form part of the discussion. If you are finding it difficult to find an appropriate time available, telephone interviews might be an alternative. Please make an effort to make contact with your child's class teacher during this time. Towards the end of term 2 a written report will be sent home.

Pupil Free Day Reminder for Next Term

Governing Council have approved a Pupil Free Day on **Monday 30th April**, which is the first day of Term 2, with a further one on Tuesday 12th June following on from the public holiday. Staff will be working with staff from other schools in our partnership with a focus on assessment and moderation processes and plans for intentional teaching. The National Literacy and Numeracy assessments for all year 3, 5 and 7 students will occur from **Tuesday 15th through to Thursday 17th May (Week 3 Term 2)**.

If there is some reason why you wish to **withdraw your child**, please see your child's class teacher with a written request and **also** see Vicki Poulain to complete an official withdrawal form. These must be completed by **no later than Friday 11th May which is the last day of week 1**.

Brightpath Writing

2018 is the 2nd year that students at Parafield Gardens R-7 have been involved in using *Brightpath*—a writing tool teachers use to target individual learning outcomes within the area of writing. Parafield Gardens was 1 of 70 schools statewide who were chosen to use *Brightpath* as part of a trial initiated by the Learning Improvement Division from the Education Department. *Brightpath* involves teachers collecting a writing sample from each student and moderating it against writing examples included in the digital platform. Once staff moderate each writing sample, they are provided with teaching points to use to move students forward in their writing. A second writing sample is then collected later in the year and moderated with the expectation that students have improved due to targeted learning occurring in between writing samples.

This year students in Years 1 to 7 are writing a persuasive text and a narrative in Term 1. Their second writing sample will then be collected in Term 4. In Terms 2 and 4, students in Reception will write a recount.

Being involved in *Brightpath* has been extremely beneficial for both staff and students. There has been an increased focus and confidence amongst students and staff when learning about different text types, being more aware of writing conventions, and writing as an author endeavouring to entertain or persuade a reader.

Take the time to talk to your child about their writing and *Brightpath*.

Parking Around Schools

Due to the chaotic nature of traffic around schools at peak times, streets can be an extremely dangerous place for children.

Young children have not yet fully developed their cognitive abilities and therefore their perception, judgement and awareness of potentially dangerous situations is not adequately developed to enable them to cope with the road traffic.

Children are not easily visible and often act impulsively, which means if you are driving around a school take special care, to ensure we keep our children safe. Remember that children copy grown-ups - encourage good road sense by watching them closely and leading by example.

5 Helpful Tips for School Zones

As parents and caregivers we have a great responsibility to ensure children stay safe in school zones. We also play a key role in educating children about road safety. Here are 5 helpful tips for safety in school zones:

1. Allow enough time to take your child to the school gate safely and without rushing.
2. Always observe parking signs and speed limits in and around school zones. They are designed to keep your child safe.
3. Talk about signs and traffic lights with your child. Identify and discuss places where it is safe to get out of the car and cross the road.
4. Teach your child how to cross the road using the 'stop, look and listen' process - stop at the kerb, look and listen for traffic and then decide whether it is safe to cross.
5. Park a few streets away and walk your child to school. This is also good exercise and helps teach your child road safety rules.

Behaviours to Avoid

- Speeding
- Double parking
- Parking too close to an intersection
- Parking across driveways
- Parking too close to pedestrian crossings



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Common Traffic Signs

The City of Salisbury has implemented a comprehensive traffic management and parking scheme in the streets surrounding your child's school to help make it a safe place.

Going against the road rules places not only your child's life at risk, but those of others. Tragedies can occur if care is not taken to abide by these rules. Below are some explanations of signs that are placed around schools to ensure your child stays safe.



No Parking Signs

Drop off and pick up only. You must not queue or wait here. The driver must remain with the vehicle.



No Parking Signs

The same rules apply as the previous

'No Parking' sign, however, the rules only apply during the times and days shown on the sign.



No Stopping Signs

You must not stop in a 'No Stopping' area at anytime. Drop off and pick up is not allowed even for the briefest



Yellow Kerb Lines

An unbroken yellow kerb line is a no stopping line and therefore the same rules apply as for a 'No Stopping' sign.



Bus Zone Signs

You must not stop within a bus zone at any time. This zone is only available to public buses.



Obstruct Driveways

A vehicle must not obstruct an entrance way or crossing point to a property, even if it is your own.

Reserves, Footpaths & Verges

It is an offence to drive or park on a reserve, footpath or dividing strip and could cause an accident, injure a pedestrian or damage property.

Please note: The parking signs at the front of our school, including within the drop off zone, have changed. These areas are now only for immediate pick-up and not for waiting. If you are waiting for your child you will need to find an alternative parking area.



Halogen Young Leaders' Day


